

# What to Bring:


Don't overburden yourself. Try to bring only what you need:

- Leather Folder/Binder
- Resume (on resume paper)
- Graduate Portfolio
- Pen
- Paper



# Fix Up, Look Sharp

- First Impressions are Everything!
- Remember, you are typically interviewing with an older generation:
  - Conservative, professional dress
  - Clean and Coifed nails, hair, jewelry, facial hair
  - Conservative makeup
  - No jeans, no tennis shoes or sandals
  - Maintain modesty
  - Be PUNCTUAL
  - Be prepared!
- There's always room for personality

#### The Interviews




- Typically, there are several interviews
